In Oregon, one out of every seven people struggles with hunger, and one out of every four children is food insecure. The rate of food insecurity (defined as being without access to a sufficient quantity of affordable, nutritious food) in Oregon is 14.6%, a number that has been growing steadily over the past few years and is now at an all-time high. However, programs like Neighborhood House's Emergency Food Box help support local families with a mission of making sure that every family is able to put food on the table. The SW HOPE: Feed the Hungry drive has a goal of raising 200,000 pounds of food, or the \$50,000 cash equivalent, through your generous donations, and we're off to a great start! Headstart Program Helps Local Mother Receive Early Childhood Education for Her Three Children



Almost 10 years ago, Kaouther Elatch was referred to Neighborhood House's Headstart Program, not knowing it would change her children's lives. As a teenager, Kaouther immigrated to the United States from Mexico, meeting her new husband, who had immigrated from Yemen. She soon had three children, and though they were lucky enough to receive public housing and did not need food assistance, the family was unable to afford preschool. The Headstart Program, which provides early education to children as well as information on parenting techniques for parents, offered Kaouther and her children the opportunity to receive quality early education. Kaouther believes that having her children attend Headstart helped them build strong social and emotional skills through allowing them to interact with children their age and spend time in a school-like setting. The family has been able to go on field trips to OSU farms, and children's museums, all of which were incredibly valuable experiences for Kaouther and her children. "What makes this program unique, in my opinion, are the multicultural and diverse families," Kaouther explains. "This gives us a chance to know one another, share childhood stories, and sing the children songs in different languages. To me, this brings people closer and removes all the different barriers. We can come from different backgrounds, but at the end of the day, we are all humans, and we all wish for a better world for our children."

Link2Feed Is the New Database That Helps the Food Box Program Better Serve the Community



We are so excited to be using Link2Feed, the new database that will help the Food Box Program track who, and how many, it's serving. Currently, the Food Box Program is in the process of entering transactions in the old database, then entering extant and new clients into the new database as registrations are submitted. Food Box Coordinator Elizabeth LaPlante said of the new system, "In March, we will have different days with interpreters from the Oregon Food Bank and extra bodies to register people live as they come in. So April will be our first month fully in the new system."

According to LaPlante, the first page of the registration packet has been very useful for clients, as it has the potential to give the program more in-depth knowledge of client needs at the local Food Box Program as well as those across the region. The hope is that this new database will allow the Food Box Program to have a better sense of who they're serving, therefore allowing the program to serve according to need and demographic. LaPlante is very hopeful that this new database will make a huge, positive impact for food insecure people in the area.
